How to use this workbook

You will be expected to work through this booklet whilst you are off. It will include much of the information that you have been learning about in your PER lessons as well as new content that you may not have covered yet.

Information

This booklet will contain all the information you will need and you will not be required to do online research. The information will always be presented in the simplest way possible, with images to support and additional explanations to give you the best opportunity to learn. However, you may wish to do online research on some information that you do not fully understand or if you are interested.

Questions

Each section will contain information and questions or tasks for you to complete. Some tasks are to help you start to think about the topic.

There are also three different types of questions:

- Green questions: These are comprehension questions that test whether you have read and understood the information present.
- Blue questions: These are to test deeper understanding of information, you will be expected to analyse and interpret quotes, actions and text.
- Purple questions: These expect you to evaluate information present, you
 will have to provide detail answers and opinions. Sometimes you will be
 expected to weigh up how strong an argument is.

Lesson 2

The Good Samaritan

Jesus is asked a question "who is my neighbour?" - that is, who am I responsible for?

He does not give a direct answer – he tells a story.

The journey from Jerusalem to Jericho was a dangerous one. It is 17 miles long. Perhaps the story Jesus tells is based on something that actually happened, or perhaps he is referring to the fear that if you went down this road then you were quite likely to get attacked and robbed! Whilst a man was making this journey, he was attacked and left for dead!

Then, a priest first walks by on the other side and does not help. There might be different reasons for this:

- 1. He might have been afraid that this was a trap and he could get attacked.
- 2. He might have been worried that the man was dead and that he would become unclean by touching the man.
- 3. He was just too busy to stop.

Then, another man came by. The second man to come by was a Levite, who again might not have wanted to touch something he regarded as unclean so he did not help either.

Finally, a Samaritan turns up. Jews saw Samaritans as their enemies, likely to want to trick them. However, this man bandages the



man's wounds, takes him to a safe place and agrees to pay for him to be looked after an Inn (a bit like a hotel)

Today, Christians take this story as the inspiration to show love for all people. Charities have taken up the name:

- 1. **Samaritan's Purse** a charity to designed to help the poorest people
- 2. **The Samaritans** a charity set up to listen to people who might think about taking their own lives.
