Bl. Some people believe that circuses with animals should be banned. Write a letter to your local newspaper, giving your views

B2. A local hotel/restaurant is advertising for part-time staff. You decide to apply and you have to write a letter of application.

Think carefully about what the employer would want to know about you and how you can 'sell yourself' as an employee.

Write your letter of application.

BI. A teenage magazine has invited readers to write a lively article about a well known person they admire or dislike. You have decided to send in a contribution. **Write your article**. [20]
