We will be studying other playscripts with this but rather than read/watch our set text (which we'll cover in class), we'd rather you broadened your horizons by watching a play of your choice. Try to see some live theatre over the summer if you can!

When you watch/read, think about how is play is different from a novel or poetry. How did the theatre company interpret the story? How was the stage/lighting used? How did the actors interpret their roles?

### Wider reading/suggested reading for your non-assessed exam component:

One exciting component of this course is the non-assessed unit (coursework) which allows you to work more independently and choose a novel of your choice to study.
